### JESUS HAS AUTHORITY OVER CREATION

Matthew 8.23-27 // Mark 4.38

The same God who sovereignly calmed the storm is the same God who sovereignly allowed the storm.

## JESUS, AGAIN, IS AFTER OUR HEARTS

So far, Jesus has been dealing directly with the heart in His sermon, and He has been cutting to the heart in His conversations. Jesus wants our faith. Our true, unwavering faith. **That we'd see all else as rubbish.** 

2 Corinthians 5.7 // 1 Peter 1.3-9

The storms of life will either shipwreck us, or strengthen us.

We do not just simply want to ask God to calm the storms of our life, but we should ask Him to strengthen us through a deeper faith in Him, to produce in us endurance, character, and a deeper hope in our inheritance which is kept in heaven by the authority that Jesus has as God, the perfect heir of the Father.

In the great Psalm 23, God neither promised to carry us *over* nor *around* the valley of the shadow of death. Nor did He say He would meet us on the other side while cheering us on and hoping we would make it. Rather, He said He would walk with us *through* it.

Romans 5.3-5 // Psalm 118.13-18 // Isaiah 41.10

"Even the winds and sea obey him."

Yet we do not.

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## COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK

Read <b>Matthew 8:23-27</b> . What stuck out to you in these verses or was the most impactful from the message on Sunday?
Re-read Matthew 8:24, then also read John 4:6, Matthew 4:2 and John 1:14. What do these verses teach us about who Jesus is?
Re-read Matthew 8:26, then also read Matthew 1:23, Isaiah 9:6 and 2 Peter 1:1. What do these verses teach us about who Jesus is?
These last few sets of verses show us that Jesus has two natures - He is fully God and fully man, yet one Person. He sleeps, gets hungry, and yet has ultimate and full authority. And at the cross, He allowed Himself to go through the worst "storm", yet could have sent angels (Matthew 26:52-56) to stop it. Instead, He submitted to His Father's will (Luke 22:42) and glorified His Father. Why is it important for us to understand and remember who Jesus is while going through a storm?
Read Isaiah 45:7, 1 Chronicles 29:11, Romans 9:21 and Revelation 4:11. Who do you believe started the storm in the first place?
Now read <b>Psalms 89:9</b> and <b>Psalms 107:28-30</b> . Couldn't God have prevented the storm from ever starting to begin with?
Theologian John Stott said, "In a world of pain, how could one worship a God who was immune to it?I have turned to the lonely, twisted, tortured figure on the cross, nails through hands and feet, back lacerated, limbs wrenched, brow bleeding from thorn pricks, mouth dry and intolerably thirsty, plunged in God-forsaken darkness. That is the God for me! He laid aside His immunity to pain. He entered our world of flesh and blood, tears and death. He suffered for us. Our sufferings become more manageable in the light of His. There is still a question mark against human suffering, but over it we stamp another mark, the cross which symbolizes divine suffering." Explain to the group how the cross of Christ helps you get through hardships and storms.
<b>Read Psalms 23:1-6 and Romans 5:3-5.</b> What storms or trials are you currently facing? Are you believing and trusting that God is with you through the storm? And why do you think God allows storms and hardships in our lives?
Read <b>Psalms 118:13-18</b> and <b>Isaiah 41:10</b> . How can you glorify God in the next, future storm that you go through?
Pray for one another, asking God to help you realize, trust and believe that He is God, yet He became a Man which means that He relates (John 16:33, 1 Peter 5:6-7) to your hardships, trials and storms. D.A. Carson says "Frequently it is when we are crushed and devastated that the cross speaks most powerfully to us. The wounds of Christ then become Christ's credentials. The world mocks, but we are

assured of God's love by Christ's wounds."
