GOD'S WISDOM IN THE RESTORATION

Revelation 21.1-7, 22.1-5 // December 23, 2018

WHAT RESTORATION IS NOT

Revelation 19.6-8, 11-16, 20.10, 21.1-7

Restoration is not "starting from scratch." To do so would be a victory for the enemy. It would mean that he succeeded in his plan to destroy. But God would not have the enemy have that kind of satisfaction. What God does is He proves His might, strength, wisdom, and victory over sin, death, darkness, and destruction by resurrecting sinful men and restoring the earth.

God's plan was to destroy the curse, not His creation. Satan's plan is to maintain the curse, and destroy creation.

WHAT RESTORATION IS

1 Corinthians 15.20-23, 35-44, 49-57 // Luke 24.38-43

Our Bodies: We can first consider our bodies. What will they be like? Jesus is our example. Jesus is the "firstfruit" of those who die in faith. Just as a farmer would inspect the first fruit of the season to get an idea of what to expect for the season, we, too, can look to the nature of Christ's resurrection to give us an idea of what our resurrection will be like. If His tomb was empty, so will ours be! We will keep this body we have now, but without any weakness or blemish.

Romans 8.18-25 // Psalm 25.13, 37.9-11, Isaiah 49.8 // Revelation 22.1-5

The Locations: Again, God won't just start from scratch, He will prove His power by *renewing* the earth! Much like a classic car that gets restored, God will take the raw material (which was "very good" to start with), strip it of the curse and any weakness, and "raise" it in alory.

EDEN WAS NEVER THE GOAL

We shouldn't think of Eden as "perfection," but as "potential."

Eden should give us an idea of what is to come, but it is only an appetizer for the main course. It was "very good," but not "finished." For now, we suffer in a fallen world with hardship and pain and sin. But in God's wisdom, He works all things for good for those that love Him, and we can look forward to an even more amazing future if we trust ourselves to Christ.

Sermon Notes Extras:

His heritage:

- He'd be of the seed of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, Genesis 12.3 // Matthew 1.1.2
- From the Tribe of Judah, one of Jacob's 12 sons, Genesis 49.10
- He would be a descendant of David and Jesse, David's father. Jeremiah 23.5, 6.

His birth and early life:

- Born of a woman, who is also a virgin. Isaiah 7.14 // Matthew 3.13, 21.11, 26.69
- He would be born in Bethlehem. Micah 5.2 // Luke 2.1-7
- Though born in Bethlehem. He would be a Galilean. Isaigh 9.1
- He and His family would flee into Egypt to save His life. Hosea 11.1 // Matthew 2.13-15

His adult life:

- In Malachi 3.1, Malachi says to God "the Messenger of the Covenant in whom You delight" will come to the temple. This may not seem like a big deal, the Messiah going to the temple, but knowing that the temple has been destroyed since 70 AD leaves the Jews unable to expect the Messiah after that.
- He'll be preceded by someone announcing His coming. Isaiah 40.3 // Matthew 3.1-3
- He will ride into Jerusalem on a young donkey. Zechariah 9.9 // Luke 19.28-38

His betrayal and death:

- He'll be betrayed by a friend who ate bread with Him. Psalm 41.9 // Matthew 26.49, 50
- This 'friend' will betray Him by handing Him over to the authorities for thirty pieces of silver; then, that payment would be thrown down to the potter in the temple, which is a burying place for strangers. Zechariah 11.12, 13 // Matthew 27.5-7
- He will be rejected, beaten, mocked, and have His beard plucked out. Isaiah 50.6, 53.3 // Matthew 26.67, 27.39-44
- His clothes will be gambled for. Psalm 22.18 // John 19.23, 24
- He would be scourged and crucified; yet crucifixion was not invented until hundreds of years after this prophecy. Psalm 22.16 // Isaiah 53.5 // Luke 23.33
- He won't be executed not alone, but alongside sinners. Isaiah 53.12 // Matthew 27.38
- None of His bones will be broken. This is significant because due to the method of crucifixion (which again, wasn't invented for hundreds of more years), executioners would break the legs of the condemned in order to speed up the process of death. This was part of the command for the Passover lamb in **Exodus**, that the Hebrews were not to break any bones of the lamb. It was a foreshadowing of the Lamb of God. Exodus 12.46 // Psalm 34.20 // John 19.32-36
- He would be buried in a tomb owned and donated by a rich man. Isaiah 53.9 // Matthew 27.57-60
- He'll raise from the grave after bearing the world's sin. Isaiah 53.10, 11 // Acts 2.32






