ENTERING INTO GOD'S REST AS A COMMUNITY

Mathew 11:28-12:14, Mark 2:23-3:6, Hebrews 3:5-4:16

Suggested resource - Jesus the King: Understanding the Life & Death of the Son of God, Tim Keller

I. SABBATH

Sabbath is a near-synonym of Shalom, the Hebrew word for "peace".

Peace - The Hebrew word is shalom (both adjective and substantive), meaning, primarily, "soundness," "health," but coming also to signify "prosperity," well-being in general, all good in relation to both man and God. In early times, to a people harassed by foes, peace was the primary blessing. (from International Standard Bible Encyclopaedia)

Genesis 2:2-3 - The Sabbath established at Creation.

Exodus 20:8-11 - Sabbath observance established in the Ten Commandments

"God rested from all his work" doesn't mean God was tired; He rested because He was utterly satisfied with His work. His work was finished, it was good, and creation experienced Shalom.

Sabbath is about worship and restoration to wholeness – restoring people in relationship to God, each other, and within themselves.

The principle of Sabbath – Jesus calls us to Himself to experience a restoration to Shalom – a restoration to wholeness in every dimension of our lives. Any religious activity that obstructs this Shalom is in opposition to God and must be opposed. Jesus didn't come to reform religion, He came to end it and replace it with Himself.

II. THE INVITATION OF JESUS INTO GOD'S REST

Matthew 11:28-30

Religion versus the Gospel -

- Religion in its various forms says I connect to God by being good, or by achieving a spiritual transformation of consciousness, or by adhering to a strict code of conduct.
 Religion is primarily advice.
- The Gospel is primarily news announcing what God has done to restore us unto Himself and each other, to bring us Shalom, to enable us to enter in the Sabbath rest. The Gospel is the end of religion.

III. JESUS, THE LORD OF THE SABBATH

By the 1st Century, the Jewish community had formulated innumerable restrictions and rules of conduct for life under the Mosaic Law, including 2 entire treatises on the details of Sabbath observance. Jesus was frequently in sharp conflict with the religious leaders over this issue.

Matthew 12:1-8 - Jesus gives four principles in response to the Pharisees' condemnation

The story of David and the consecrated bread (1 Samuel 2:6)

- If they're going to condemn Jesus the disciples, they'll need to condemn David too!
- We should emphasize discernment and compassion, not rigid legalism, when applying the commandments of God to people's lives

The priests who break Sabbath in order to facilitate worship

- Just as the priests' duties in Temple surpassed Sabbath rules, Jesus' ministry surpasses the Temple
- Our love and worship of God is far more important than the forms and practices we have developed for the act of worship. "true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks." (John 4: 23)

The Old Testament Prophet's call for Mercy, not religious practice

- This comes up frequently in the Old Testament 1 Samuel 15:22-23, Psalm 40:6-8, Isaiah 1:11-17, Jeremiah 7:21-23, Amos 5, Hosea 6:6
- Religious rituals are only valuable when they fulfill their purpose loving God and loving people. Amos 5:21-24

Jesus is the Lord of the Sabbath – he is the fulfillment of everything Sabbath means, He is the source of the deep rest Sabbath was always meant to provide

IV. HEALING AND THE SABBATH

Matthew 12:9-12 // Mark 3:3-6

The relation of healing to the principle of Sabbath is so important that Jesus does this 5 different times in the Gospels

- The man with the shriveled hand, Matthew 12:9-12
- The woman crippled by the evil spirit, Luke 13:10-17
- The man with dropsy, Luke 14:1-5
- The man at the pool of Bethesda, John 5:1-18
- The blind man, John 9

Healing is a perfect application of Sabbath - restoring to wholeness

Every time we minister healing (in the fullest sense of the word – spiritual, physical, emotional, relational), we are in a very real way fulfilling the Sabbath

V. ENTERING HIS REST AS A COMMUNITY

Hebrews 4:1-3, 9-11, 16

The exhortation to the community of faith

We should tremble with fear at the prospect that any of us might not enter Jesus' rest, striving that none of us fail to enter.

The provision that empowers us to fulfill the exhortation

With confidence we draw near to the throne of grace where we find empowering grace we need – we preach the Gospel to ourselves and each other; we intercede in powerful prayer for each other; we live a life of Jesus' rest that inspires each other.

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COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK

Read Matthew 11:28-29, and discuss these phrases:

"Come to me"

What does that mean, really: is it simply believing the Gospel or something more than that? In what ways have you come to Jesus?

"All who labor and are heavy laden"

In what way do people labor, and how are they "heavy laden"?

"I will give you rest"

What does the rest of Jesus look like? How have you experienced that rest?

Pastor and author Timothy Keller wrote: "Why does Jesus become angry with the religious leaders? Because the Sabbath is about restoring the diminished. It's about replenishing the drained. It's about repairing the broken. To heal the man's shriveled hand is to do exactly what the Sabbath is all about. Yet because the leaders are so concerned that Sabbath regulations be observed, they don't want Jesus to heal this man— an incredible example of missing the forest for the trees... Their hearts are as shriveled as the man's hand. They're insecure and anxious about the regulations. They're tribal, judgmental, and self-obsessed instead of caring about the man. Why? Religion." (Jesus the King: Understanding the Life and Death of the Son of God, pp. 36-37).
