LANGUAGE FOR LANGUISHING

Psalm 77

This Psalm is written by Asaph, one of the chief musicians and a skilled poet. The first half of his Psalm is one of complaint, fear, giving up, and depression. He is questioning God and His promises. It is an honest and raw prayer.

The goal of repentance is not to make you pay.

The goal is to make you glad.

PLEADING YOUR WEAKNESSES

God's people have a long history with depression and anxiety. As we look those in church history, we see C.H. Spurgeon, Oswald Chambers, Martin Luther, Martyn Lloyd Jones, John Calvin, and so many others who, in their own lives, have found comfort and solace in the trials of the biblical lives of David, Asaph, Job, Elijah, Paul, and even Christ Himself.

Psalm 77 gives us an example of this seeking out of God's faithfulness in the lives of others. In **verses 10-20**, the psalmist's mind is turned towards God's works. Though he is not facing exactly what Moses and the Israelites did, he relates and finds help for his soul.

In Asaph's weakness, he remembered that God's way may not be out of a circumstance, but trusting Him going into it.

PLEADING THE PROMISES OF GOD

The beauty of God's promises is that they are not dependent on the strength of our faith in them,

They are dependent on the strength of the One who gave them.

There are times, like with Asaph, that we won't have much strength to even believe in God's promises. But the good news is that He has sworn to Himself that He will remain faithful. In these times, we can and should put on display not some kind of self-strength, as if God needs us to make Himself look good. Rather, we boast in our weakness so that He is shown as faithful.

Some things we never get over. Rather, God simply gets us through them.

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COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK


Before your group starts, is there anyone who can share the Memory Verse?

- 1. Read Psalm 77. What stuck out to you from these set of verses or what did you take out of the sermon on Sunday?
- 2. What is most shocking about some of the language that Asaph uses here?
- 3. Read verses 19 and 20 again. Here Asaph recalled the story of the Israelites escaping the Egyptian army. Think about your own life, something in the past or current, and how this story can relate to you. What did (or do) you want to have happen in a certain circumstance, and how did it actually happen? How do you now look back and see footsteps that were previously unseen?
- 4. In this time, Asaph was nearly inconsolable. He fainted upon meditation and groaned upon the thought of God. Yet in God's goodness, He brought to Asaph's mind this story that he previously had known. What other stories in the bible have helped you find comfort in certain circumstances in life?
- 5. Read 2 Corinthians 1.3-11. How do the themes in Paul's writing here relate to what we see about some of the language used in the Psalms?
- 6. Much of Asaph's and the other psalmist's tendency to turn their psalms of complaint and despair into psalms of hope, rest in them doing diligent work before times of sorrow. How have you seen your time in the Word, even now particularly in the Psalms, as a way that has been helping you prepare for the days that "the waters" try to overtake you?
- 7. When is the last time you prayed honest, ualy, unfiltered prayer? Did it turn to reminders of God's goodness like Psalm 77? Or did it stay a prayer of pain like **Psalm 88**? Where are you at with that prayer now?

Spend time as a group praying in the P.R.A.Y. model, which is modeled after the Lord's Prayer. Share with the group situations in your life that you need to be able to have honest and real prayer for.
