THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW: A BACKGROUND

- Matthew was a Jewish tax collector, disliked by Jews and seen as a traitor.
- He was educated and skilled to keep numbers, records, and to write.
- He was called to be one of the 12 disciples.
- This Gospel was written around 50-60 AD.

THE PHYSICAL GENEALOGY OF JESUS CHRIST

Genesis 3.15, 17.5-7 // 2 Samuel 7.12, 13

Matthew 1.1-17 is the physical genealogy of Jesus through his step-father Joseph. There are three sets of 14 generation, which are not complete, but highlighted by Matthew to help Jewish readers memorize and recognize that Jesus is the legal heir to the throne of David. Fourteen was the symbolic number of David, since the numerical equivalent of David's consonants, D-V-D, equal 14. This was a well-practiced Jewish method called "gematria."

This King came for and from sinful people, And He came to save these people from their sins.

THE SPIRITUAL GENEALOGY OF JESUS CHRIST

Matthew 1.18-25 // Isaiah 7.14 // John 1.1-14

Isaiah, about 680 years before Jesus was born, foretold that a Man would be born of a virgin, thus showing His deity.

What's in a Name? Someone's name was not just a simple, sterile label or ID tag for someone. Their name represented what or who they were or stood for. Thus, though the names "Emmanuel" and "Jesus" are clearly not the same, they speak of both the character, nature, and purpose of this young baby being born. He is both "Jesus," which means "God is salvation," as well as "Emmanuel," which means "God with us." He does not save from a distance, but He is personal.

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COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK

Read Matthew 1.1-26. What stuck out to you the most from this text or from the sermon on Sunday?
We looked at the "angle" or perspective that Matthew was writing his Gospel. What was it, and why did he write from this angle?
How does knowing the context, such as knowing Matthew's background and purpose, help us understand the Word?
Chances are, you have skipped over the genealogy of Jesus if you have read this part of Matthew before. Read 2 Timothy 3.16, 17 . How does this seemingly boring section of Scripture actually point us to the Gospel?
From showing us the sinful backgrounds and various ethnic backgrounds, to pointing out a clear path to David and Abraham, we see that God has preserved His promise to send a Chosen One, a seed of the woman promised in Genesis 3.15 , to save His people from their sins. Why must this Redeemer be a Man, and why must He also simultaneously be God?
As we move forward throughout the Gospel of Matthew, we will who this King is, what His Kingdom is, and how citizens of His Kingdom are to live as well as the hope they have as citizens. Not only that, but we will see how His citizens are to be on His Kingdom mission to expand His Kingdom throughout the earth, being a blessing to all nations. Read Genesis 1.28, 17.5-7, Matthew 28.18-20, Acts 1.8, and 2 Corinthians 5.18-21. In light of Jesus' coming to the earth to fulfill these Old Testament commands and promises, what is our part now, as citizens of God's Kingdom, to be a part of this fulfillment?
In what ways are you, or can you start being, a blessing to others for the sake of the Gospel? How can your group be praying for you when it comes to these opportunities?
