BUT WHY?

There are innumerable reasons why God might allow hardship. Here are a few.

- To bring about good. Genesis 50.20
- That the work of God would be displayed in your life. John 9.1-3
- To prepare us for eternal awe in unending bliss. Romans 8.18
- To prepare us for the ministry of reconciliation, compassion, and sacrificial generosity. **2 Corinthians 1.3-12**

PUNISHMENT VS. DISCIPLINE

A common thread in all the biblical examples is the result of God using someone to show mercy. From Joseph to Paul, David and Jonah, and of course, Jesus, God bringing hardship brought about good for others. One thing we can rule out, however, for every believer, is punishment. If Jesus has been punished for your sin, then God will not punish you also.

If we need any convincing that hardship is *not* proof that God is somehow "making us pay" or bringing it about because of His displeasure towards us, consider Jesus: He was homeless, rejected, mocked, deserted, and eventually killed. And yet God said to Him, "this is My Son, in whom I am well pleased."

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COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK

Before your group starts, is there anyone who can share the Memory Verse?

- 1. Read Jonah 1:3-17 and your Sermon Notes from Sunday. Is there anything that stood out to you from these verses or was the most impactful from the message on Sunday?
- 2. Jobey talked about God's sovereignty on Sunday, Read Colossians 1:15-20. Do you believe that "in him, all things hold together"? Is the doctrine of God's sovereignty comforting to you? Explain in what way?
- 3. Do you have any reservations or hesitations about the doctrine of God's sovereignty? If not, do you think any of your non-believing friends would have trouble with the idea of God's sovereignty? Why?
- 4. Do you trust that God can use bad or evil things for His glory? Read Exodus 9:12, Habakkuk 1:5-7, and Genesis 50:19-21. If not, why is this difficult to comprehend?
- 5. Do you ever think that the world deserves to be free from suffering or evil? Read Romans 3:23 and Isaiah 53:6. (Note that even God's chosen prophet, Isaiah, used the term "WE all like sheep . . . ", and not "YOU all like sheep ... "? Even God's prophet and someone God chose to write a book in his Bible, admits he had "gone astray"!). _
- 6. Read Isaiah 43:7. The Westminster Catechism states: "Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy him forever." What was God's purpose in not allowing Jonah to finish his journey to Tarshish? What do you believe your purpose in this life to be?
- 7. Are you living your life for your own glory or comfort or plans, or are you living your life for God's glory? Are you submitted to His plans for your life, even if that means bailing on your plans to go to "Tarshish" and instead going to "Nineveh"? Spend some time in prayer and meditating, and ask God what you can do to submit yourself to His plans for your life? How can you get onboard with His plan to make His glory known? Be prepared to share your thoughts in your Community Group this week
