NOT ALL ARE SAVED Matthew Chapter 7.12-27

MAKE BELIEVERS: BLESSED ASSUMPTION

Matthew 7.12-23

This text is one of the most sobering in all of the bible. When we examine our lives, we can sometimes realize that we can easily rest not in "blessed assurance," but "blessed assumption." A few things to note about this challenging text:

- These people genuinely believed they were saved.
- These people genuinely had some type of external "fruit."
- These were not believers who "lost" their salvation, but rather Jesus "never" knew them.

TRUE BELIEVERS: BLESSED ASSURANCE

How do you know if you are really a believer?

HELPING OTHERS SEE JESUS

So how do you help someone know if you are really a believer?

Ultimately, we can't know for sure whether a person who professes Christ but living in sin is saved or not. We do pray for discernment, as well as grace and love. But we also should not live in a false "blessed assumption." We need to seek God on how we can help point them to the Gospel of Christ.

SAVE.

Jesus was sent to save. We have been saved to be sent. We are sent into our community to share the Good News that Christ came to save us, and we hope to see many who find new life.

EQUIP.

We want to equip those very people in the Word so that they can continue to grow as disciples of Christ. From our preschool to our adults, our passion is to see everyone equipped in the Gospel to live a life of freedom and joy.

SEND.

Lastly, we then want to see those equipped people sent into their community and world. From schools and playgrounds, to families and work places, we want to see people who are spiritual leaders in their life, showing people the truth of Christ's Good News.

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COMMUNITY GROUP HOMEWORK

Read Matthew 7.12-27. What stuck out to you the most or was the most impactful from the message on Sunday or from these verses?
The question of whether we can lose our salvation or not is known as the doctrine of "eternal security" or "perseverance (or preservation) of the saints." Why do you think it's important for us to have a good, solid understanding of this doctrine?
The bible lets us know that it is possible and important for us to know for sure whether we are believers. 1 John is rife with verses about this; John's purpose in that epistle is so that we would know for sure. Read 2 Corinthians 13.5. Why does Paul ask the Corinthians to examine themselves, and what do you think the "test" might be?
Clearly, the test is not just <i>saying</i> you are a believer (for instance, by saying "Lord, Lord!"), and the test is not just <i>doing</i> things that are "Christian" activities (going to church, reading the Word or even casting out demons!).
Read 1 John 2.19, 20, James 2.19 , and 2 Timothy 3.1-9 (focus on verse 5). How do these passages show us that simply saying or believing that you are a Christian is not what it takes to ensure that you are a Christian?
Martin Luther famously said, "we are saved by grace alone, but the grace that saves is never alone." Read the verses he is echoing in James 2.14-20, 26. Our works will <i>prove</i> that we are saved; but remember these works are not just outward works of obedience, but <i>most importantly</i> inward works of repentance, heart change, worship, and love for God and people (fruit of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5.19-26)). In what ways have you seen "evidence," even if small, that you are saved and that the Holy Spirit is truly at work within you?
In what ways can you cultivate more fruit so that you can be more and more assured that you are an adopted child of God? See Colossians 1.23 for a clue. Then read John 17.17, 2 Timothy 3.16, 17, Hebrews 4.12.
Lastly, on Sunday, Jobey mentioned how he often attempts to help people who claim to be believers but are walking in a life of sin to "self-examine" themselves. Read through Matthew 13.18-23 . What other verses do you think are good "self-exam" verses that you can use to share with others in your life who might be

resting in their "blessed assumption"? Add those people to your prayer time, and

ask God for the opportunity to use you to share these truths with them.
